What Does it Pay?

The pay schedule for regular season games is established by the contract agreement between Section 3 Athletics and the officiating boards for each sport. Depending on the sport, pay ranges from \$46.50/game for a modified game to \$96.00 for a varsity game. Additionally, mileage is also paid as it is outlined in the contract. There is some up front costs to get started, which would include training, officials uniforms, equipment and fingerprinting.

Do You Have What It Takes?

If you know the game as a player, parent or fan and like the idea of playing a role in promoting the growth of the sport, this is your chance. Any individual who is 18 years of age and not in high school may officiate interscholastic athletic contests. It helps to have participated in the given sport you wish to officiate, however it is not required. It is important that an official possess a very thorough knowledge of the rules of the sport, a love of athletics and kids, physical ability, self confidence; the dedication and determination to work hard; and personal integrity. Athletes and coaches look at the athletic contest as being the most important thing happening in their lives, so it is imperative the official also looks at the contest in the same way and reacts accordingly.

If you have further questions, please contact the sport specific association representative to gain more insight into the world of officiating. If you decide you want to move forward, they will assist you in getting the process started by providing meeting dates and specific requirements. The earlier you contact the individual the more assurance you will be able to start as soon as possible.


